The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning is an independent, charitable arts organization that operates an historic, City-owned building as a dynamic arts hub. We create and coordinate accessible programming and events for all levels of experience and abilities.

The J.K. Tett Centre is home to nine resident arts organizations, eight individual artist studios, four multi-purpose rental spaces, and a beautiful waterfront café.

We strive to be a welcoming destination where artists, arts organizations, and the community come together to explore, create, and be inspired.



Executive Summary

The 5th year of operations at the Tett was a success, with nearly 28,000 visitors to the Centre for TCCL-led and partnership programming, tours, rentals, and events alone: a 15% year-over-year increase. Cumulatively, with activities at the other eight resident arts organizations and the creativity studios, this represents a visitorship of at least 58,000 persons, comprised of a broad spectrum of ages, experience levels, and artistic interests. Factoring in patronage of the Juniper Café, we estimate that total foot traffic to the building reached 124,000 visitors.

2019 programming highlights included the ever-popular Kids Creativity Club on Saturday mornings, our Creativity Series for adults, Family Day and Culture Days open house events, summer tours in partnership with the Isabel Bader Centre for Performing Arts, and our Tett Tuesday Open Studio programming.

Rentals generated over \$278,166 in revenue in 2019: a year over year increase of 7.9%. Events, workshops and art camps contributed an additional \$26,989. Expenditures increased

by 14.7% as a reflection of additional costs for procuring professional consultation and adding new Tett Staff. These investments resulted in an in-year deficit of \$8,056 for 2019.

OPERATIONS

Services and Activities

Services at the Tett Centre, provided by staff and volunteers, are aimed at:

- Supporting the internal arts organizations by providing a collaborative arts hub
- Welcoming the public to the facility and informing users of its operations

Activities that support our mandate as an arts centre for the community include:

- Programming and Workshops: for all ages, designed and run by the TCCL or offered in partnership with renters or artistic collaborators.
- Professional Development for community artists and arts organizations.
- Events: multi-faceted arts-oriented events, open to the public and typically buildingwide or centered in the Malting Tower
- Rentals of spaces and equipment including: tenant suites, Creativity Studios, the Juniper Café, the Malting Tower, the Rehearsal Hall, The Activity Room and the Tett Gallery

Our Rental Spaces

In 2019, the Tett Centre Staff Team welcomed a new Rentals Coordinator, Susanna Gordon. This staff position was created to elevate our rental program by providing clients with dedicated customer service in all aspects of their rental experience.

The four, versatile rental spaces at the Tett Centre bring in vital revenue that enables our charitable organization to provide accessible arts-focused programming for the community.

- Activity Room (600 sq.ft.): An ideal multi-purpose space for hands-on arts programming, collaborative projects and small meetings and presentations.
- Tett Gallery (1000 sq.ft.): An exceptional space for personal or group exhibitions, creative performances, gallery showings, sales, workshops and meetings. We are proud to rent the Tett Gallery for community artists as a non-commission exhibition space.
- Rehearsal Hall (1500 sq.ft.): A uniquely designed creation space perfect for dance, yoga, small theatrical performances, large workshops, or special gatherings.
- Malting Tower Room (1600 sq.ft.): Our finest rental space, offering a balance of historical charm and modern technical features for special occasions (eg. weddings, graduations, celebrations of life), business meetings, and a variety of arts performances, small concerts and events.

The Tett Centre is a popular location for photography. We welcomed 11 professional photographers to use our beautiful, heritage location for various photo shoots throughout the year.

The table below shows number of rentals by type. The type of rental determines the base rental rate. The Tett Centre offers a considerable discount (25%) to rental clients who meet our eligibility requirements.

An increase of Arts-Focused and Not-for-Profit rentals is an indication that we are meeting our mandate annually to provide affordable rental space for community artists and arts organizations. The number of arts-focused and not-for-profit rentals accounted for 83% percent of our total rentals in 2019, in comparison to 71% in 2018.

Our total number of rentals increased by 50% from 2018. Base room-rental revenue was \$65,559 and the Tett Centre derived an additional \$25,956 in revenue from furniture rental and administration fees.

The Ballytobin Foundation supported one arts organization in 2019 by funding their rental at the Tett Centre: the Kingston Wood Artisans. This community organization rented the Rehearsal Hall for their annual member showcase.

The Juniper Café

In May of 2019, the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning was excited to welcome a new café owner, Raissa Sarkisian, to continue operations of the well-loved Juniper Café. This waterfront gem is a treasured gathering place for resident organizations and artists and the community. The café offers a delicious, unique menu created with locally sourced ingredients.

Facility Improvements

The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning is grateful to the City of Kingston (as building owner and Master Landlord) for continuing to make improvements to the building in 2019. A renovation of the Juniper Café space in May 2019 included a new durable floor and an upgraded HVAC system. To support operations of the café, our servery kitchen (adjacent to the Malting Tower rental space) was retrofitted with more refrigeration and storage. A Tett Custodian was hired in 2019 (Catherine Snider) replacing an external cleaning service that had been engaged for the first four years of operations.

ACTIVATION

Engagement and Participation

We welcomed nearly 28,000 visitors to the Centre for TCCL-led and partnership programming, tours, rentals, and events alone: a 15% year-over-year increase. Cumulatively, with activities at the other eight resident arts organizations and the creativity studio artists, this represents a visitorship of at least 58,000 persons comprised of a broad spectrum of ages, experience levels, and artistic interests. Factoring in patronage of the Juniper Café, we estimate that total foot traffic to the building reached 124,000 visitors.

2019 Tett Centre programming highlights include:

• The Kids Creativity Club, a very popular Saturday morning program which runs from

September to May each year, is an opportunity for families to get creative together. Donations of \$1,860 were gratefully accepted to support the expenses for this drop-in community program.

Tett Tuesday Open Studio is an opportunity to carve out time for monthly art-making. It is
a place to gather and work alongside aspiring, emerging, and professional artists and
crafters in the Kingston community. Each month participants bring their own project and
art materials and enjoy a relaxed and casual atmosphere to create and connect.
This free event, for participants aged, 18+, is hosted in various spaces around the Tett
Centre, and we saw an increase of registrations in 2019.



At each Tett Tuesday Open Studio, participants can expect to meet a social, thriving, and likeminded community, who enjoy free demonstrations, skill sharing, and open conversations.

Participants take advantage of full access to our studio spaces, and work on a wide variety of their own arts projects, including: felting, embroidery, acrylic, watercolour, photography, oil painting, knitting, collage, drawing, rug hooking, book

binding, writing, digital art, illustration, printmaking and more! Tett Tuesday is a fantastic opportunity to try new mediums, ask for feedback, trial techniques, and find new inspiration.

In June 2019 we hosted the second Tett Tuesday Exhibition & Sale. It was well-attended and many artists sold their work to enthusiastic patrons. We are proud to be a non-commission gallery to ensure that all revenue from these emerging and established artists is collected by the creators themselves.

- The Tett Presents: Creativity Series of artistic workshops for adults continued with some unique programming added to our regular offerings: Air-dry Clay, Fibre Arts, Felted Ornaments, Acrylic Painting, Chinese Calligraphy, Yoga & Music, Pumpkin-Carving and more.
- Summer Tours on Fridays in July and August, in partnership with the Isabel Bader Centre, were led by our Arts Administrator. These free tours are an opportunity to

introduce visiting tourists to our beautiful building and talented resident artists. Inside the Tett, tour-goers see rental spaces that are not typically open to the public and get a first-hand look at the creative process of art making. Two organizations were featured during each tour plus the open Creativity Studios.

Arts at the Tett Summer Camp

The Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning was delighted to offer its 5th annual immersive one-week summer program for children aged 8-13 years.

The program is a fantastic opportunity for children to discover new mediums, build confidence, and find new ways of problem solving. Participants have the ability to explore a variety of art-forms: 'Metal Rocks' (jewelry and gemstone exploration). pottery, weaving, felting, movement, liquid glass pouring, drumming, bookbinding, decorative handwriting and more. Participants engage with local artists, community volunteers, and



arts organizations who lend their expertise and resources on-site. Our dynamic schedule provided 45 young artists (in small groups of 9) a diverse arts experience unlike any other in the city. On the last day, we proudly showcased all artworks made during a special open house for families and friends.

Open House Events

Our annual building-wide open houses are an opportunity for the public to explore our arts centre and to try a variety of hands-on arts experiences. These events continue to be well-attended with nearly half of the total visitors being new to the facility.

Family Day Tett Open House was a hit on February 18th, 2019. The Tett Centre hosted a variety of <u>free</u> family-friendly activities and performances for the community. We kicked off the morning with two back-to-back Gary Rasberry concerts, and enjoyed family yoga with

Becca Snowdon, Kids Creativity Club with Christina Maclachlan, a Coffee & Colour Station in the Activity Room, Twisted Balloons with Julie, Play with Clay in the Kingston Potter's Guild, fibre art demonstrations with the Kingston Handloom Weavers & Spinners, Face Painting with Theatre Kingston, workshops and studio tours with the Creativity Studio artists, Quilt Making with Modern Fuel, Wire Wrapped Gemstone Trees with Kingston Lapidary Club, an open house with Joe's Mill, and a Mid-Winter Dance performance with the Kingston School of Dance. We enjoyed busy corridors, full studios, and happy faces throughout the day.



In September 2019, the Tett Centre for Creativity & Learning was an official hub for Culture Days. The Tett offered a wonderful selection of accessible performances and arts activities for all ages and abilities. The weekend aimed to promote participation in and appreciation of the arts, and it is a great opportunity for the community to explore the Tett Centre.

During the 3-day event, the Tett Centre hosted a variety of activities, such as: Afrisa Dance with Abena Beloved, Kids Creativity Club, Participainting, the Culture Hotel experience with For Forever, Hexaflexagon Activity, an exhibition by Pengyuan Wang in the Tett Gallery, and a series of performances in the Malting Tower, including: a Family Sing-along with Maria Horner, a Flamenco Music Performance, and a Drum Circle with Ollin.

In addition, each Tett tenant offered programming and tours during the Tett Open House. Participants enjoyed: The Kingston Potters Guild's Richardson Bath House Mosiac project, Creativity Studio tours, Wire Wrapped Gemstones with the Kingston Lapidary Club, Modern

Fuel Gallery Tours, Joe's Mill Open House, Kingston Art Council workshops, face painting with Theatre Kingston, Kingston School of Dance performances, fresh cookies at the Juniper Café, and fibre crafts with the Kingston Handloom Weavers & Spinners, there was something for everyone to explore!




Community Partnerships

Being part of an arts community means recognizing the value of collaboration and meaningful partnerships.

- The TCCL partnered with Karen Peperkorn, local arts educator and founder of the Creative Arts Focus Program, to coordinate an exhibition of high school student art. This was an art-exchange with Kingston's Sister City Scottsdale Arizona to celebrate 25 years of friendship. Former Kingston City Councillor and Coordinator of the Kingston-Scottsdale Sister City Program, Sandy Berg, led the engagement of this partnership. The Sister City Teen Art Show involved artwork produced by Kingston students from the Limestone District School Board displayed at the Scottsdale Mustang Public Library, and then a similar exhibition of artwork made by Scottsdale students from Scottsdale was displayed at Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning. The exhibition, titled "Global Citizens: Resilient Communities" opened on June 29 and ran until July 26 and was displayed on the limestone wall outside of the Creativity Studios on the second floor.
- In 2019, the TCCL partnered with community organizations for events that were open to the public: the Kingston Film Office, Kingston PRIDE, and LCVI Studio LC Film Night.

User Feedback: We listened!

To ensure we are serving the needs of the community, and meeting our mandate as a 'welcoming destination where artists, arts organizations, and the community come together to explore, create, and be inspired', we pay very close attention to the on-going verbal and written feedback we receive. One way to assess how our audience is enjoying our programmatic offerings, and how they are using our space, is to conduct regular user surveys. In April 2019 we released another survey. We also updated information on our website to help inform users of our facility's provisions.

The Tett Centre is proud to be one of Kingston's leading employers of local professionals in the arts and cultural sector for community programming. The Tett Teaching Artist Roster played a key role in our ability to provide arts instruction for a variety of experience levels and ages in 2019. Artists with a variety of professional backgrounds can apply and become part of the programming our organization creates to complement the creative activities of our resident groups and artists. The TCCL paid a total of \$23,638 to local artists for arts instruction for Tett-created programming. Additionally, a total of \$2647 was paid to local audio-visual technicians in 2019.

Marketing

Event and programming news is shared with our audience via social media platforms and our very popular newsletter, coordinated by Danielle Folkerts, Marketing and Programming Coordinator. Using our social media as a prime marketing tool, our followers and subscribers can learn about workshops, seminars, and performances created by the Tett Centre, our resident arts organizations, artists, and rental clients.

The Tett Centre has also produced several informative rack cards that can be found on all floors: a map, a history of the Tett, Tett Tuesday Open Studios, and Kids Creativity Club.

Using Eventbrite as our primary means of promoting Tett-created programming (in addition to our other social media platforms and posters) has proved to be the most efficient marketing tool and the easiest way for the community to register for workshops. We have encouraged and trained many of our regular renters, resident artists and tenants, to also use Eventbrite in conjunction with other social media platforms.

Governance Changes in 2019

Following on the 2018 City-commissioned review of Tett Centre governance undertaken by KPMG, the TCCL Board was transformed to phase out directors nominated by subtenant organizations, and to appoint successors from the wider community. In 2019, TCCL Board Chair David Kerr worked closely with the City legal team, the TCCL Facility Manager, Board Officers and subtenant representatives to update the corporation's Bylaw #1 and processes in ways that best support the operational integrity and future potential of the TCCL. Provision was made at the AGM in June 2019 to extend David Kerr's term as Board Chair to the end of March 2020, to provide continuity in completing the governance transformation to meet the recommendations of KPMG. Initial key updates to Bylaw #1 were passed by TCCL Members at a Special General Meeting held in December 2019.

Further changes to the Bylaw #1, once ratified by the Members (expected at the 2020 AGM), will create an effective non-profit corporation, still at arm's-length from the City of Kingston, with a structure that is compliant with Provincial legislation. The structure ensures this wonderful civic facility will attract wide community involvement and will continue to be responsive to the needs of both the city's arts community and TCCL subtenant organizations.

2019 Financial Summary

The Tett Centre remained debt-free in 2019. We posted a small in-year operating deficit of \$8,056 despite an increase in revenue. In operational terms, 2019 revenue was up 4.8% (year-on-year). There was a 50% increase in the volume of rentals translating to an increase in rental revenue of \$20,267 (+7.9% from 2018). 2019 Expenditures increased by \$58,795, by 14.7% year-on-year. Expenses were higher due to an increase in professional fees and the addition of new staff.

Financial Support

The City of Kingston (through the Department of Cultural Services) provided the Tett Centre with \$122,000 in Municipal financial support in 2019, including \$38,424 earmarked for regular repair & maintenance in accordance with the Facility Level Service Agreement (Schedule D of the Master Lease between the City and the Tett Centre) and \$19,276 that was placed in a capital reserve to be used by the City for future improvement and maintenance of the J.K. Tett Centre.

The remaining \$64,300 of the Municipal Contribution was used by the Tett Centre to help support full-time staff in meeting the goals of the organization and fulfilling the needs of community engagement and the arts hub. It is important to note that the financial support from the City effectively constituted about 27% of total Tett Centre revenue (the same as in 2018).

Provincial government funding for the TCCL (\$5900) was provided through an Ontario Trillium Foundation capital grant to renovate our most used rental space, the Activity Room.

The TCCL was proud to be chosen as a designated Ontario Culture Days Hub (see page 11) and we greatly appreciated a stipend of \$1500 to support the expenses associated with the event (hiring artists and purchasing supplies and equipment).

We are grateful for the generous donations made to our charitable organization throughout the year at our events, at our drop-in programming (Kids Creativity Club and Tett Tuesday Open Studios), directly in our office, and through Canada Helps. The TCCL recognizes our annual contributors on a special donor plaque in the main stairwell.

Forward Guidance

The TCCL Board of Directors has approved a balanced operating budget for 2020. The Board decided to increase subtenant base and additional (CAM) rent by 1.9% and 1.0% respectively. The annual budget provides for transfer of approximately \$13,500 to capital reserve.

As per the KPMG recommendations, the TCCL Board of Directors has established an Operation Stabilisation Reserve of \$80,000.00 which will be used under exceptional circumstances to cover operation losses. The Tett Centre has been building capital reserve to take care of future repair and replacement of capital assets including those owned by City of Kingston.

Subsequent Events - COVID -19

Subsequent to year-end, there was a global outbreak of COVID-19 which had a significant impact on business through the restrictions put in place by the federal, provincial and municipal governments regarding travel, business operations, and isolation/quarantine orders. It was a non-adjusting event for the TCCL as the pandemic happened in late January 2020. At this time, it is unknown to what extent the COVID-19 outbreak may affect our organization. The TCCL has applied for Government support programs which includes Canada Emergency wage subsidy (CEWS) and Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) and we will be looking all options to take advantage of other Government support programs expected to roll out in the coming weeks. The TCCL has been working closely with subtenants and has agreed to defer April 2020 rent until the end of the year 2020. Also, the TCCL Board of Directors agreed to be open to subtenant requests on case-by-case basis to support them during this tough time.
